SCHOLARSHIP FUND

At the September Board Meeting the Venice Branch Board approved the Scholarship Fund Ad Hoc Committee Report.

The Committee recommends establishing a Scholarship Fund at Gulf Coast Community Foundation, Venice, FL.

GCCF requires a minimum of \$25,000 to create an Endowment Fund enabling granting of scholarships in perpetuity from the fund. Distribution rate 4% annually.

ADVANTAGES: GCCF provides the following support to the branch:

Continue to use board-approved criteria to grant non-traditional scholarships

Branch continues to review, interview and select recipients

Branch continues to hold Honors Luncheon to award scholarships

ADMINISTRATIVE ADVANTAGES of GCCF:

Provides secure up-to-date on-line application

Provides access to large pool of applicants

Has dedicated administrative staff

Assures compliance with non-profit IRS rules granting scholarships

Coordinates transfer of funds and verifies student enrollment.

Endowment Fund: branch can add funds to initial \$25,000
Option for Pass-through Scholarship Gift Fund
From Home Tour, other fundraisers and donations
Grant up to \$20,000 in pass through scholarships annually

COST TO VENICE BRANCH

Endowed Scholarship Fund

Minimum \$25,000 to establish fund Quarterly fee of 1.50% on fund balance = \$375 yearly initially

Pass-through Scholarship Gift Fund

Flat annual fee = \$250 Fees charged from endowed fund Fees charged regardless of fund activity

Member Spotlight: Meet Marge Ostrom Judith Houston

You could easily say about her that she's done it all – marriage and family, a career in science and until recently, president of the Venice AAUW branch.

Her parents emigrated from Sweden in the first quarter of the twentieth century. She says, "For them, their opportunity was coming to America. I've always liked math and science. Education has always been my opportunity."

After growing up in New Jersey, she got her bachelor's degree in chemistry from Rutgers University, then joined Lederle Labs, a pharmaceutical company, where she synthesized organic compounds for research.



Marriage to her high school sweetheart and his job offer from General Electric meant a move to Schenectady, New York. The four children who followed "put a damper on career plans" and converted her into a stay-at-home mom. GE was bringing in a large number of scientific and technical employees and many of the men had wives with similar backgrounds. She found them when she joined the AAUW chapter there. "It was a younger crowd," she says. "The branch even had daycare so the women could meet without their children."

In 1972, another career move for her husband took the Ostroms to Connecticut. While family remained her focus, she also went back to school and was awarded a master's degree in biology from the University of Hartford in 1978. While she was pursuing her master's, the University opened a health center in 1974. Her new degree and academic contacts she made helped her land a position there initially doing research in pediatric dentistry. She stayed there for seven years and was part of a study team funded by the National Institutes of Health (NIH). This brought her in contact with professors of nutrition and their suggestion she look into a fellowship program offered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) that would allow her to pursue a doctorate in nutritional sciences.

So it was back to school. This time, she was commuting to the university while two of her children, also enrolled there, were living on campus. In 1989, with a Ph.D. in hand, both she and her husband were looking for new jobs. The search took them to Columbus, Ohio, and for her a new opportunity with the Ross Product Division of Abbot Labs, in charge of nutrition research focusing on improvements for soy formula isomil (for babies intolerant of milk). For her, it was a "dream job," that involved a great deal traveling and research.

When it was time to retire, she and her husband began as Florida snowbirds, spending a half-year in Port Charlotte and the rest of the year in Connecticut. Their children had relocated to a number of different states so they made the decision to become full-time Florida residents. Luckily for us, that meant Venice. That was in 2009 and she connected with this branch after taking that year's home tour.

Her skills and dedication were quickly recognized and she served as the Venice branch secretary for four years from 2011 to 2015. At the same time, she took on assistant director duties for Tech Trek, the science camp for middle school girls, when it was based at Eckerd College in St. Petersburg. She enthuses about getting girls interested in careers in science and technology, and says, "At Tech Trek, girls learn that if they want to pursue studies and a career in a STEM field, they can. There is nothing to stop them from succeeding.

She has just "retired" again; in July, she finished a two-year term as president. She says her enthusiasm for the Venice branch is sparked by our dedication to advancing equity for women.

Given her past achievements, keep watching what's next for this talented woman.

GENERAL MEETING MINUTES, SEPTEMBER 13, 2017

The meeting was called to order by President Kathleen Pickering at 12:28. Following the speaker, Alison Nash of the State College of Florida Foundation, Kathleen began the business portion of the meeting. A new addition to the regular meetings will be a Focus on the Mission. Title IX and its importance and success in promoting women was the presentation for this meeting.

The minutes of the annual meeting in May were approved as published in the Venice Views.

Carol Cudia presented the Treasurer's Report and Budget. A motion to approve the budge was made by Fran Brinkman and seconded by Judy Evenson. There was no discussion, and the motion was passed by voice vote.

The president's announcements included:

- The Giving Challenge will take place in May. When the exact date is announced, notice will be sent to our members to participate.
- Funding from Education Foundation of Sarasota for Academic Olympics has been discontinued, so the branch will also discontinue the program locally.
- A brief report on the National Convention and the Equity Luncheon.
- Members who have not filled out volunteer forms were urged to do so, and turn them in to Kathleen. Volunteers are needed in these areas: LAF dinners, Spring Luncheon and additional help to further the Strategic Planning.

New Business:

Marge Ostrom presented the findings of the Ad Hoc Committee on Scholarship Fund. It was approved by the board to establish a Scholarship Fund at Gulf Coast Community Foundation of Venice. A motion to accept the recommendation of the board was made by Sue Owen and seconded by Susan Luterbach. Discussion followed.

An amendment to the motion was made to postpone the vote until the branch institutes a one member, one vote process. All members of the branch would get information on the proposal and be able to vote. AAUW National will help set up the process. The motion was seconded by Kitty Rodriguez. The amendment vote passed. All further discussion was discontinued until the process in the amendment is carried out.
