Member Profile: Meet Suzi Barbee

The new steward for the 2019 AAUW Home Tour, our chief fundraiser, is Suzi Barbee. She's new to our branch but has been a member in previous home states of Maine and Texas.

She came to her first Venice meeting the day before the 2018 Home Tour, and was immediately pressed into service at one of the homes. She agreed to take on the upcoming tour because "I saw how well it was organized."

She brings to the task a wide array of credentials. As an undergraduate (degree from TCU in history and economics), she worked in the university library. She later parlayed that into a public relations position with the Ft. Worth, Texas, Public Library system.

Later professional credentials included consulting in a heavy industry field. She was based in her native state of Missouri but the position allowed her to travel a lot -- 50 weeks a year. "That's the part I really liked," she says.

She moved back to Texas because "I just liked it there," and became an entrepreneur of a successful antique business she started, returning monthly to Missouri to "buy stuff" for the shop. When she married, she and her husband started a wholesale book business, which allowed them to spend summers in Maine because sales slowed down during the summer.

After four years of full-time retirement in that northern climate, they moved to Pt. Charlotte, Fla. This is a geographic midpoint for her husband's involvement with the Edison-Ford home museums in Ft. Myers and Suzi's volunteering with the Ca d'Zan in Sarasota where she is a docent several days a week.

Houses, particularly historic houses are in Suzi's DNA. She grew up in an historic house and the home she left behind in Maine was the Captain Tobey House, an old sea captain's home. (She does like to point out that the house really belonged to a woman and once she married, the locals started referring to it as the home of her husband.)

An inveterate home tourer herself, she says she has been through at least 400 historic homes or castles over the years. She's also given Gilded Age Victorian home tours in Portland, Maine, and attended Victorian Society Summer School in Newport, R.I. to learn more about the architectures of that period. Although constructed later, she says the Ca d'Zan typifies the style of the last of these Gilded Age homes.

What's Ahead with the Home Tour?

A lot of the groundwork has already been accomplished for the upcoming tour. That includes solid commitments for homes, all of which are on the Island of Venice. Theme for the tour will be "Island Gems."

There is no co-chair as there has been for the past several years but a number of committees have been formed to break down tasks into manageable pieces. There are additional roles that Suzi would like to see filled, however. She's comfortable heading up the tour but she would love to see a member come forward to take on data management, computing and texting. "That's the area where I'm weakest," she says. If you want to help in this area (or any other), you can find Suzi's contact information in the Members Only section of our website.

She'd also like to expand the artisan area at the homes, perhaps to have two at each home instead of just one. "There was at least one vendor last year who almost ran out of merchandise by midday. It would be great to have someone take that on and expand our artisan participation."

Raffle baskets are another way to increase income. One thought she had was a dining basket with gift certificates for a number of area restaurants. Another idea is a percent off a meal at participating restaurants on Home Tour day by showing the tour ticket. She'd like someone or several individuals to take on that effort.

Her first experience with our home tour impressed her with our "collegiality." Let's get behind her now because Tour 2019 is only about five months away. Suzi points out that "Home Tour is a great way for new members to get involved, meet other members and become part of our team. It makes the Scholarship Luncheon more enjoyable because you know you helped make these scholarships happen."



PROPOSED 2018-19 BUDGET

Fran Potter Director of Finance

Below is the proposed Venice branch budget for Fiscal Year 2019, which has been approved by your Board of Directors. Members will vote on it at the September 13th meeting.

This fiscal year's budget fully supports objectives identified in the branch's Strategic Plan including:

- Increasing and retaining broad-based membership through increased promotional and membership initiatives including the use of Constant Contact.
- Continuing to send girls to Tech Trek; a commitment fully funded through funds raised in the Giving Challenge.
- Improving educational opportunities for Girls with new and continuing programs.
- An additional fundraising project, which will be developed from the brainstorming session this spring.

Additionally the budget includes funding for non-traditional scholarships and the Venice Branch American Fellowship Fund, which is supported by Home Tour revenues.

Changes from previous budgets include:

- Since the Holiday and Scholarship Luncheons are really membership events and not primarily fundraisers, they have been moved to a new category of Branch Member Events;
- In keeping with practices followed by other non-profits to refer to monies held in reserve, the category formerly titled "Retained Earnings" is now "Net Assets";
- To ensure our assets are fully utilized, funds that were held in past reserves (for example, for Venice Views, American Fellowship, Girls Activities) are being "paid out" from Net Assets to be included in income for these projects in the 2019 Fiscal Year.
