AAUW VENICE BRANCH GENERAL MEETING MINUTES - SEPTEMBER 10, 2019

The program was presented by Pat Weber and Mary Emerson with presentations by two of the Tech Trek participants.

Shirley Reid, who is moving soon to the Philadelphia area, was presented a plaque detailing her significant contributions to the Venice Branch and to the state of Florida AAUW organization, and especially for her efforts initiating Tech Trek in Florida. She was also presented a bouquet of flowers.

President Kathleen Pickering called the meeting to order at 11:55 AM.

The May minutes were approved as printed in the Venice Views.

The September attendees were thanked for providing the lunch.

Treasurer - Fran Potter presented the treasurer's report - Currently, the savings account has a balance of \$6,188.43 The checking account has a balance of \$10,568.70.

Kathleen Pickering hosted a cocktail party fundraiser which raised \$1305 for Tech Trek.

The 50-50 raised \$54 for Tech Trek.

Development – Joan High presented the details for the fundraiser “Tea for Vee” scheduled for November 4, 2019 at Plantation Country Club. Samira Easton reported on the need for homes to be included in 2020 Home Tour.

Membership – Patti Warner reported we currently have 223 members plus 4 new members. New members and guests were introduced.

Public Policy - Kathy Black – seeking members for this committee. Leslie Curley is researching Title IX and seeking to assess its current status in the state and possible outreach communications as well as members for this task force.

SIGs – Pat Comeau announced that coordinators are needed for Outdoor Activities and Armchair Travelers.

Programs – Jane Farley addressed the importance of the Equity Luncheon held this past August with guest speaker, Erika Quartermain. One change to the October program was noted. The speaker will be Patrick McLean from the Brady Foundation. The Hospitality committee was praised for their outstanding organization of the monthly luncheons. The concept of team captain was also presented.

Communications – Judy Houston announced the donation of \$250 to the Jacaranda Library for a youth program staffed by NASA volunteers and submitted a press release to the Gondolier. She also announced the receipt of a \$500 grant from the state AAUW to be used to develop the AAUW Venice's project to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the 19th amendment. She plans a video based on “Let's Rise to the Occasion” to link the work smart program to the 19th amendment. Judy is seeking additional grant funds from local foundations.

Old Business - Kathleen Pickering presented details regarding the member survey which will available for completion using Survey Monkey after the October 2019 meeting.

Paula Dulski presented the completed goals and those in process of the strategic plan.

New Business -Fran Potter presented the budget for 2019-2020. Motion made to approve the budget by Barbara Wyshner, seconded by Samira Easton. Approved via show of hands with one opposed.

Kathleen Pickering addressed the 5 Star Program.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:30

I grew up in Indianapolis and left to attend the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor where I met my future husband on a blind date the first week of school--arranged by our respective roommates. I earned my B.A. degree in 1953, majoring in Spanish.

We were married in 1954 when he was between his sophomore and junior years of medical school, and following his graduation, we lived in Grand Rapids for 20 years where we raised our two sons and a daughter.

In 1977 we moved to Roanoke, Virginia, where we lived for 22 years before retiring and moving to Venice which we had "discovered" when vacationing in Englewood for several winters.

My "career" was largely spent in volunteer work wherever we lived, and my main interest has been in teaching English as a Second Language

which began in the 60's when our church sponsored a wonderful, young refugee family from Cuba who left as Castro was coming to power. I found it so rewarding that I taught others and went back to Aquinas College in Grand Rapids to get Secondary Education Certification. I continued to teach ESL as a volunteer when I became the Education Coordinator for the Office of Refugee Resettlement in Roanoke for a few years, but I found that administration was much less rewarding than actual teaching.

Other volunteer work has been with Meals-on-Wheels, and I worked weekly with that organization continuously from 1977 until last year.

Another interesting endeavor was working a shift one day a week at a Crisis Intervention Center in Roanoke where we manned a 24-hour telephone Help Line plus a 4-BR shelter with a one or two-night limit. Also in Roanoke, another church member and I organized a social club for about 25 ex-hospitalized mental patients who lived in various homes in the area.

I now look forward to my membership in AAUW and supporting the projects that contribute to the education of women which I feel is a very important mission. I'm also excited about joining some of the many social activities that the group offers and meeting more of the interesting women than I've already met through Mary Al Gagnon who encouraged me to join.

Elaine Jarchow earned her bachelor's degree from Ohio University and a master's degree and Ph.D. from Kent State University. She taught high school English in Ohio for nine years before holding faculty and/or administrative positions at Iowa State University, New Mexico State University, UNLV, and Texas Tech University. She also served as dean and helped to establish universities for Arab women in Saudi Arabia and the UAE. She finished her career in higher education at Northern Kentucky University where she served as dean of the college of education and dean of international education. She is happily married to Ron and proud of daughter Elizabeth who is an Indiana high school principal. She enjoys playing bridge, swimming, reading, attending plays, and watching movies.
