MEMBER SPOTLIGHT MARY ANN DILLAHUNTY



While many of us have been locked down to distance ourselves from pandemic concerns, Mary Ann Dillahunty has been in the midst of it as an "essential" worker.

She's been contributing her time and skills to our branch since she and her husband moved here full-time in 2014 from the San Francisco area. For several years before that, "we were bicoastal." She has been a hostess at a Home Tour home for three years or you may know her as one of the home selection co-chairs of our most financially successful 2019 Tour.

You may not know her in another role, as president of the all-volunteer Venice Meals on Wheels which celebrated its 50th anniversary last year. She's been involved with this non-profit after seeing a call for volunteers in the *Venice Gondolier*.

She started as a substitute driver on one of the 16 routes this organization serves, then became its secretary and this year, president. For 30 years, Village on the Isle, a senior living facility, had been cooking and packaging the meals the organization delivers as well as providing office space and a staging area to transfer meals to delivery vehicles.

With the virus, Village on the Isle was unable to prepare meals or allow use of their facility by these "outsiders." Mary Ann was able to secure prepackaged frozen dinners from a catering service the County utilizes at its emergency centers. The Friendship Center, closed to its usual clients, allowed them to utilize some space and its parking lot to stage deliveries. Later, with some procedural changes, Village on the Isle was able to resume meal preparation.

She says volunteers deliver "a thousand meals a week." In spite of these setbacks "we never missed a meal." In the past, some 20 percent of recipients were income-qualified to receive meals at no cost. With rising number of folks needing meals, that number has risen to 30 percent. She stresses that Meals on Wheels is doing this with "no government funds and relies strictly on donations." The organization was a first-time participant in the Giving Challenge this year and "we did very well."

She's always on the lookout for additional volunteers because we "lost about ten percent of them because they were either in a high-risk health category themselves or a family member was. Continuing to be out in the community while many were quarantined was very rewarding and it's kept me busy."

Staying busy is her lifestyle, a follow-up to a career as an attorney practicing intellectual property law specializing in biotechnology and pharmaceuticals. Even with that, she found time while she was working to join an AAUW branch in Half Moon Bay, a community south of San Francisco. "In my experience," she explains, "AAUW women are attuned to current events in the nation and their community. And our projects show they care about other people in this world."

Caring is a quality she exemplifies; she's an asset to our branch and the community at large.

GET READY TO ZOOM PAM SWARTS

To meet safely, stay connected, and get even better acquainted, the video conference platform called Zoom, will be the Venice AAUW 'meeting room" for the foreseeable future. If you are not already a Zoom member, visit www.zoom.us and register for free. Upload a photo and save your login. Watch a "getting started" tutorial and check out tips!

Zoom orientations in August focused on several do's and don'ts:

DO:

- -Use a computer with a larger screen and built-in camera if possible. iPads and cell phones will work, but they are less effective in terms of tools and options to see everyone.
- -Plan a setting that puts a source of light in front of you (not to the side or behind you) to avoid shadows on your face.
- -Join early (10-15 minutes before the start of an event) to conquer any technical glitch or enjoy chatting.
- -Dress as you would for a face-to-face event; It is a small step toward normalcy!
- -Experiment in advance with how you want to look and what background you want others to see. **

DON'T:

- -Leave your microphone on and make noise; even coughs are distracting.
- -Violate personal space by moving too close to the camera.
- -Talk over others; learn to use the chat room.
- -Jeopardize the schedule; being brief at the beginning allows more time for open sharing at the end.
- -Slouch, stretch, or move in and out of the setting without first turning off your video.

**Set up a Zoom Experiment (It's OK, no one can see you!)

To really look good in a video conference requires planning! Those morning talk show hosts on TV have a ton of help with staging from home. Zoom allows this, though it takes some patience. Click through the following after signing in to Zoom: (zoom.us/sign in); Personal Meeting Room; Start Meeting; Open Zoom Meeting; Start Video. Now try out ways to "stage" your own Zoom persona! Remember, you are alone.

- 2. Play around: Pretend you are a TV personality broadcasting from home.

 Soft direct lighting in front of you: No sharp light behind or beside you, which puts your face in shadows.
 - ♦ Uncluttered background but show some personality
 - ♦ Camera angle at eye level, no ceiling views of fans, please
 - Dress as you would for a live meeting with the group; assume good posture
 - Take control of unwanted noise
 - ♦ Have what you need at hand!

"Now one step closer to her goal of becoming a mental health professional, Keiser University student Heidi Tinney is thankful for her educational experience and a scholarship courtesy of the American Association of University Women (AAUW).

Motivated to eventually serve as a psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner, the Keiser Sarasota campus learner is working toward her <u>Bachelor of Science in Nursing</u> degree with plans to graduate this August. She has the goal of working either in a trauma and emergency room setting or for a local community health clinic for two years to gain hands-on experience before returning to school in pursuit of her <u>Doctor of Nursing Practice</u> degree.

"I have experienced several roadblocks and trials in life that have made me a stronger woman, so I'm thankful to apply what I've learned to assist those in need," said Tinney, a recent widow and the mother of a three-year-old son. "The advice that I would give to potential nursing students is to persevere and not give up on yourself. Life does not cease to throw curve balls, but as long as we are confident, count our blessings, believe in our ability, and remain determined then we have the foundation to overcome adversity. If you believe in your heart and soul that being a nurse is your calling, then I suggest you go after your dreams without hesitation."

Tinney credits Keiser University faculty and classmates for continued encouragement. "The tremendous support I've received from faculty has been astonishing, I've never felt such compassion and empathy while continuously being encouraged to advance my professional and personal growth. I would also like to address my nursing cohort and the other cohorts, as their generosity, selflessness, and willingness to help in any given situation is just amazing. I cannot begin to articulate the gratitude I have for every one of them," she smiled.

As part of her generous scholarship and grant package, Tinney was awarded \$5,000 by the AAUW's Venice, Florida Branch. She is also grateful to the Gulf Coast Community Foundation, which administers applications and funds for the scholarship. The American Association of University Women works to close the gender pay gap through education, research, and advocacy. With 250 members, the Venice branch of the AAUW is the largest branch of the organization in Florida and one of the largest nationally. Its mission is to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research."
