
Many of you have been the recipient of pay discrimination, not being hired on the basis of sex and much more of what RBG wrote about. I can remember graduating with my BA in business and

EDUCATION UPDATE

Despite the epidemic, the AAUW Education co-chairs are hard at work. Our focus is on Tech Trek, the Work Smart and Start Smart programs, Scholarships, Title IX and other areas that advocate for women and young girls. The girls chosen for Tech Trek this past year will attend the camp next summer along with the recipients who will be chosen this year. Pat Weber and Joanie Leeds will be contacting local middle schools for their recommendations. Paula Dulski will continue to share information about the Work Smart/Start Programs, sponsored by AAUW. Both of these programs provide online courses which help women learn how to research their target salary, highlight their accomplishments, negotiate for better benefits and pay and become more confident in their career options. Research shows that one year out of college, women are already paid significantly less than men and this gap grows greater over time. Women working full time earn about 82 cents for every dollar that a full time male worker receives.

Our Scholarships this past spring were awarded to four nursing students. They shared their stories and the impact these monies have had on their lives at our October 10th AAUW meeting via Zoom. AAUW strongly supports Title IX and we hope to teach our membership about this vitally important law and continue to advocate equity for women and girls. AAUW encourages diversity and inclusion, and to this end, we hope to begin a tutoring/mentoring program with the Laurel Civic Association located in Nokomis. Over 500 students throughout the year are involved in the programs offered at the Laurel Center. Mr. John Jefferson, who heads the program, welcomes AAUW volunteers via Zoom or in person. He wants "his kids" to foster respectful relationships, have good adult role models and learn vital lifelong skills. A tour of the facilities is being planned and more information will be given at our November meeting.

Member Profile

Stephanie Hallowell

"I might be small but I'm feisty," is how this special education teacher described herself when a school principal interviewed her for her first position at a Maryland inner-city school. She was 23 years old at the time and hired for a seventh to ninth grade Exceptional Student Education Resource Room program, a job she held for the next four and a half years.



That was a world away from Sapporo, Japan, where she had been born into a military family. They moved every few years – to Hawaii, Alabama, Germany, Pennsylvania, Maine, and Maryland.

A childhood friend with developmental disabilities made her aware of specialized education needs. After high school, she began at a community college near her parents with the initial idea of becoming a teacher assistant. With her interest growing, she completed a double major (Elementary Education and pre-K – 9th grade Special Education) at Slippery Rock University in Pennsylvania.

When her parents moved to Inverness, Fla., in 1981, she and her husband transplanted themselves as well. While teaching, and raising a family, she completed her master's degree, and ultimately became a National Board-Certified instructor in her field. After devoting 34 years to varying exceptionalities, Stephanie focused her attention on the growing reading initiative "Just Read, Florida." She became a certified presenter and traveled the state training teachers seeking their reading endorsement requirement. Spending the last five years as a Title I Reading teacher, Stephanie retired in 2015, after forty years in public school education.

The move to Venice was prompted by an empty nest and Citrus County's rural character. Her two sons are actively serving in the Army, both following their grandfather's military path. One is stationed in Hawaii and the other in Maryland. Here in Florida, she says, "I have my husband and my fur babies --- two dogs and a cat, all rescues!" Searching for more entertainment and cultural experiences, they traveled south and discovered Venice. "Everything about it, just felt right!"

Like many members, she was introduced to AAUW by a friend. She says, "It appealed to me because of its mission statement. I believe, as educated women, we are meant to use our accomplishments to set an example for others with guidance, support and fortitude, their goals can be achieved."

Since joining our branch, she co-chaired the Home Tour 2019 ticket committee, headed up the SIG "Exploring with Your Camera" group, and now is organizing all the SIG groups. This last function has been especially challenging with meeting limitations imposed during this pandemic.

Stephanie also volunteers at the Venice Performing Arts Center (currently on hiatus), and weekly at St. Francis Animal Rescue.

Since she cannot staff the SIG clipboards while we meet virtually, she urges you to connect with her to see what's happening with any and all SIG activities that interest you.
