

Her talk, "Art Brings Learning to Life" will focus on the 1913 Armory Show which introduced Modern Art in the United States. Women played a huge role in the show's success. Over 80% of the funding for the Armory Show came from suffragettes and more than half of the European

works on exhibit were already owned by them. This show led to the founding of the MOMA, the Whitney Museum, and the Peggy Guggenheim Collection.


Wishing you a Happy New Year and I cannot wait until we can meet in person again.


## TASK FORCE INTRODUCES THE NEW STRATEGIC PLAN

## Member Profile: Meet Pam Swarts

She's been an educator, administrator, and entrepreneur who describes herself as "a small-town Iowa girl."

She had a desire, while still in high school, to become an architect but no one told her she needed advanced secondary math classes to pursue that goal. When she arrived at Iowa State University, she channeled her interest into a degree in interior design, a program based in the school's college of home economics. Retail jobs in home interiors felt "less than professional," so she returned to ISU to complete a second bachelor's degree in home economics education..."just about the time home ec was being phased out of high schools and when I

could have pursued a master's degree instead."

She stepped up to the community college level where she taught interior design, then joined administration to head up the state's community college audio-telecommunications system. "It was a new way to implement distance learning," she explains, and managed this function at 24 campuses throughout the state, with this system giving way to newer technology after 16 years.

At the same time, she supported her husband in his dental practice and raised two children. She was also active in the Marshalltown branch of AAUW, where she is past president and served on the state board. She also ran and was elected to four terms on the local school board.

In 2001, with her AAUW co-chair for diversity, she helped develop "Latinas al Exito," which means Success for Hispanic Girls." She explains, "We helped link high school Latina girls with college-educated Latinas with the goal of changing the family vision for their girls." Initially funded with a grant from AAUW National, it secured additional funding from several foundations. Nearly 20 years later, it is an established, school-sponsored program in many school districts across Iowa, has a paid executive director and includes boys (newly named Al Exito! to reflect its expanded mission).

When she retired from her community college career, she started a business in 2006, "Art & Frame on Main." It was a consignment art gallery and framing service which thrived for more than a decade. One year after opening, she was diagnosed with non-Hodgkins lymphoma and underwent three years of chemotherapy. "The experience gave me empathy and the business kept me going."

After repeated urgings, she came to Venice for a five-day visit with a lifelong friend. She says, "I was immediately drawn to Venice by its small town feel and big city art and cultural venues." One of her two children lives in nearby Bradenton; her daughter is in Minneapolis. She is also continuing her passion for art and by working part-time at Gulf Breeze Art and Framing.

Even before moving here, she put "join AAUW high on my list." She dove in and took on a house manager role for the 2019 Home Tour. Her multi-faceted skills are in high demand for us while we have to meet virtually during this pandemic. She's become our "go to" Zoom manager. She's also co-director for programs, all of which have called on her technical knowledge to link speakers and members.

She's proven herself to be very resourceful and we have a real resource in her.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:18 AM.


