MEMBER SPOTLIGHT ON JOAN ARMSTRONG



This co-chair of the branch Public Policy group is an old hand at organizing after decades of involvement with New York State United Teachers.

She will be managing Lobby Days on March 17, a virtual event like so much of our activities in this era of Covid. Joan recommends we join them: "Our legislators get a feel for their grass roots. I like to think we are driving some actions with these representatives."

Many of the issues this group addresses in Tallahassee are the same ones supported by State and national AAUW: pay equity, the \$15 minimum wage, and Title VII among them.

After a degree in elementary education from the College of St. Rose in Albany NY and graduate work at State University New York at Oneonta, she spent most of her 27-year teaching career near Utica at Mt. Markham Central School, many of them with third graders. "My favorite age group," she says.

She was also active in a national program for teacher staff development from the National Federation of Teachers. For several years, she developed and taught a Beginning Teacher program at a regional teacher center. In addition, she conducted workshops on cooperative learning and instructional design.

While busy with her own family of husband and two sons (now with four grandchildren), she found time to be involved with a group called "Annie's fund," a program of the Women's Fund of Oneida and Herkimer County, which supplied emergency payments to women in need. For three years, she served as a board member of the Women's Fund.

Her initial route to Florida was prompted by family visits to her mother-in-law who had a home in Sarasota. Subsequent connections to a friend who moved to North Port brought her and her husband to Venice.

She was invited to join our branch by Jane Farley, one of our "star recruiters," and has been a member for about ten years. Joan says, "A lot of the political action initiatives I did with United Teachers transfers to what we can do in AAUW." Before taking on the public policy initiatives, she was also involved in our scholarship committee.

Since moving to Florida, she's taken on volunteering at Loveland's day care program for mentally handicapped adults. It's now curtailed due to Covid. She says, "I hope to go back!"

She and her husband spend about five months a year at a lakeside home they own near Old Forge in New York's Adirondack Mountains with kayaking taking up some of their outdoor time.

To which we say 'Get rested!" We have plenty for you to do for the other seven months you spend in the Sunshine State.

2021 HOME TOUR MORPHS INTO "UN-TOUR"

This year we are raising funds to support the 2021 scholarships by hosting an Un-Tour fund raising campaign. We have a three-prong effort for our Un-Tour event.

Articles will be sent to the local newspapers telling the public about our Un-Tour funds raising event and asking them to donate \$25.00 (the cost of a House Tour ticket) to our branch. Donations can be made either using a credit card or writing a check. Venice AAUW is partnering with the Gulf Coast Community Foundation to collect the contributions for us.

An eblast message with the information about contributing to the Un-Tour will be sent to the names collected during last year's house tour when people sign up for a drawing of two free tickets for the Eleanor Roosevelt play. Also, the eblast will be sent to people who purchased tickets to the Eleanor event via the ticket website.

Members will receive an email with the information about sending contributions to Gulf Coast Community Foundation. Members can share this email with friends and relatives who have purchased House Tour Tickets during previous years from them with the hope they will contribute to the Un-Tour fund raising.

The need is still there, and this would help raise funds this year for these non-traditional scholarships, directed at women who have had to delay or interrupt their education and are returning to pursue a degree.

The virtual branch meeting will welcome guest speakers John Jefferson, staff member and youth program coordinator at the Laurel Civic Association Inc., and Kim Jansen, program assistant.

We will gain an overview of a non-profit organization that has made steady progress over the past 32 years in addressing the

needs of disenfranchised families and children in all parts of Sarasota County. More specifically, we will learn about a homework assistance program that instills an appreciation and commitment to school, teaches volunteerism, social skills, and soft skills which are so much needed in the workplace along with enhances self-worth.

Jefferson states, "The heart of the program is our volunteers! The impact we've seen over the 29 years we have been working with Sarasota County schools is a 96% high school graduation rate for children in our program since 2001."

Plan now to attend and listen carefully for ways the homework assistance program might fit into Venice AAUW's strategic plan: Let's seek to learn (1) In what specific ways do volunteers contribute? (2) How does this work during a pandemic? (3) What qualifications are needed? (4) How is support provided? (5) What are the intrinsic rewards?

On August 10, 2020, Laurel Civic Association Inc. received the 2020 Non-Profit Business of the Year award by the Venice Chamber of Commerce.


SPECIAL INTEREST GROUPS


FEBRUARY 11, 2021 GENERAL MEETING REVIEW
