November program Recap: "Keeping the Arts Alive"

Guest speaker, Linda DiGabriele, wowed the AAUW audience with her candor, intelligence, and warmth!

Ms. DiGabriele has served as Managing Director of Asolo Rep Theater for more than two decades, and fulfilled leadership roles with professional theatre most of her adult life. This placed her in the extremely difficult role of leading her organization – and collaborating to help lead other performing arts organizations – through the pandemic.

We learned that first and foremost, it's about caring for your people: performers and backstage employees and well as all of the support and administrative people who didn't have a job when live theatre came to a halt on March 14, 2020.

A second major thrust was programming in the age of social distancing, and Linda described the outdoor staging that brought much joy to performers and cautious audiences. Currently, with a return to in-house productions, she shared the collaboratively-developed safety protocols now in effect among the 9 leading arts and cultural organizations in Sarasota County. The caring and creative thinking that was spurred by the Covid crisis has had lasting impact! One example is a newly-formed Office of Diversity and Inclusivity at Asolo Repertory Theatre.

"The financial impact of the Asolo and other arts and cultural organizations (together the 3rd largest employment sectors in the county) was very interesting and surprising.

Member Spotlight on Charlene Turczyn

Charlene currently heads up two of our groups, reflecting her wide-ranging span of interests.

On the one hand, she's organizing the euchre group which meets twice monthly. And on the other, she's running Financial Fitness sessions, because she believes in education to help women "obtain skills needed to gain and manage their financial well-being."

This latter is a thread that has run through her life for many years. She joined the Women of the Moose and became involved in their Mooseheart program which "reaches out to disadvantaged kids to assist with their care and education." She also joined AAUW in Springfield, III., where she maintained a residence, with an interest in promoting STEM careers for girls."

That work she refers to modestly included several entrepreneurial undertakings, with security clearances needed for the high-level placement of personnel for the federal government. It included travel to military bases in Germany. Her location in Venice was handy because it was close to McDill as well as the Ft. Myers airport, which for some time "had easy flights into Frankfurt." Before embarking on a career, she earned a bachelor's degree and a master's, both from the University of Iowa.

Although she and her husband have lived in a number of locations, she's been in Florida for nearly three decades. She says, "We lived on the Atlantic side of the state for my husband's business and moved to the Gulf side in 2010 to be close to family." Her two children are further away - a daughter in California and a son in Iowa.

She rejoined AAUW and our branch shortly after arriving here and "likes the fact that AAUW encourages women to educate themselves so they are financially independent."

She was actively running her business until 18 months ago when she retired, a status she's still getting used to.

TECH TREK

Even though the pandemic canceled in-person Florida Tech Trek camps in 2020, 93 girls from 20 different AAUW branches participated in a one-week virtual Tech Trek Camp. Zooming from home materials mailed to them made the hands-on classes possible. Each camper chose and using two-hour core classes each day. These included computer science, wearable tech, marine mysteries, structural engineering and neuroscience. A total of 16 lab workshops, each 90 minutes long, were offered, with each camper selecting one workshop daily. Campers could learn how to create videos of their Tech Trek experience, discover their own DNA, learn how each brain is unique, design a barrier to fend off storm surges, and much more. The campers attended virtual field trips which included the South Florida Science Center, Next Era Energy to learn about solar and wind power and Toyota Teen Drive 365 On Demand- The Engineering Behind Safety, to name a few. These middle school girls listened to STEM professionals from across the country that participated in virtual panels discussing astrophysics, robotic surgery, civil engineering and even included a statistician from NASA Langley. What an amazing opportunity they were given! Unfortunately, none of the schools our Venice chapter approached took advantage of this wonderful program. As a result, the budget balance designated for Tech Trek is about \$ 15,000, which is more than enough to pay for the girls who would like to participate. With the 2022 camps being in person next summer, hopefully we will have some attendees.


Fund-Raiser with Pizazz!
