JANUARY GENERAL MEETING PRESENTATION



Our January 20, 2022, member meeting will feature Dr. Karen Holbrook, Regional Chancellor of the University of South Florida Sarasota-Manatee. Given her vast University experience, Dr. Holbrook will be speaking on 'Collegiate Women Today'. Dr. Holbrook is highly respected at the University as an outstanding scientist, administrator, corporate director and strategic planner. Colleagues call her "a truly excellent leader in every respect!"

Dr. Holbrook is a champion of students in higher education. She supports the USF Young Innovator Competition among many other youth

opportunities. Interviewed by Sarasota Magazine, Dr. Holbrook says, "I love connecting people and being helpful. I see situations where I can use my experience and network to connect people to meet their goals, for the good of USFSM and hopefully for the good of the community."

Dr. Holbrook has an extensive and impressive background in higher education. She was appointed regional chancellor at University of South Florida Sarasota-Manatee in January 2018. She previously served as USF's EVP and senior advisor to the president of the USF system; SVP for global affairs and international research; and SVP for research, innovation, and global affairs.

Dr. Holbrook earned bachelor's and master's degrees in Zoology at the University of Wisconsin in Madison and a doctorate in Biological Structure at the University of Washington School of Medicine where she served as a postdoctoral fellow in dermatology, faculty member and research administrator. Early in her career was an active biomedical researcher and NIH MERIT Award investigator. She subsequently served as the interim president at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University; the president at The Ohio State University; SVP for academic affairs and provost at University of Georgia; VP of research and dean of the graduate school at University of Florida; and the first woman to be named associate dean at the UW School of Medicine. Dr. Holbrook serves on numerous boards, advisory panels and councils in education and health-related fields.

MESSAGE FROM OUR VICE PRESIDENT SUSAN FARSTRUP



Among the multiple disruptions caused by the pandemic, we were prevented from celebrating the century milestone of the 19th amendment as we had planned. As we look back, we must also focus on the future. Equity and the right to vote are part of the DNA of our organization. As stated on aauw.org, "AAUW is committed to open and fair elections, nonpartisan voter education efforts that will promote equitable political participation and representation in appointed and elected office, and the expansion of voting rights."

The Florida AAUW website reminds us that we are bipartisan, but we hold important values which are in danger of being eroded. In addition to coordinating the annual Lobby Days in Tallahasee, the state public policy committee leads voter education and get-out-the-vote campaigns.

Women's voices must be raised in support of fair elections with convenient voting access for all qualified citizens, legitimate voting districts, and accurate certification of the results. We must guard against the rollback of voting rights through voting restrictions and maneuvers to overturn election results. The accusations of, and belief in voter fraud are motivating tactics for legislation to inhibit the right to vote and impede the legitimate counting and certification of votes. Our democracy can't lose what we as women fought so hard to achieve a century ago.

I want to introduce myself with a short, true story. Our school psychologist came to see me after working with a precocious kindergartner. The child was quickly able to go through a list of difficult vocabulary words but when he got to **mosaic** he thought and thought and finally said that he didn't know who **Moe Saik** was but he knew **Mrs. Ehik**; she was the principal. Young children don't see the world as we adults do. A good part of my professional life has been devoted to helping adults understand this concept and work with children in age appropriate ways. In fact, many times adults don't listen to each other carefully; communication is critical to achieving understanding and positive relationships. This has been another part of my career.

How did I get to this point? My earliest teachers were my grandparents and parents who came to the United States from Hungary. Education was so important to my family that my parents purchased an insurance policy to help me go to college when I was born. How could I possibly let these wonderful people down? I entered kindergarten not speaking a word of English and went on to earn a Bachelor of Science Degree, three Masters Degrees, and two Doctorates from Columbia University, a PhD in Communication and an EdD in Education. I have experience in prekindergarten through the college level, was an assistant principal in Fairfield, CT, and a principal in Greenwich, CT. I've done workshops individually and with groups, both nationally and internationally; I've also been a solo consultant or part of a group conducting training programs for business corporations, medical consortiums, educational groups, and even the military.

In the year 2000 I decided to semi-retire to Florida with two job offers to consider. I decided to give myself a year off and help my son open his toy store on Venice Island. The store turned out to be "fun" so I stayed there for 18 years and then decided to semi-retire again. I immediately joined our church choir and decided to finally join AAUW after being away from it for 58 years. I look forward to being a member and getting to know everyone better.

SPOTLIGHT ON MEMBER MARY FRITZ



She's one of only five members in our branch who have helped shape AAUW for more than 50 years. In Mary's case, it's actually more than 60 years but who's counting.

This snowbird, who is a dual member and past president of her branch in Plymouth Canton, Mich., has a lot of "firsts" in her credentials. She was the first member of that branch to be elected to statewide office. She served on the Michigan AAUW board of directors and took on a stint as editor of its statewide news bulletin.

Her Michigan branch is about to celebrate its 70th anniversary and she's been "zooming" from her winter quarters to help with the festivities. Although she won't be on hand for the anniversary event, she wrote a history of her home branch and was interviewed from Venice to share details from that account along with her personal memories.

She played a formative role in a major fundraising project for that Michigan branch, live drama for youngsters, now in its sixth decade. "They are doing Peter Pan this year," she reports.

She retired from a lifetime of educational positions, the last one as Director of state and federal programs in the Plymouth Canton District community schools. Her educational achievements include a Ph.D. (Wayne State University) in educational leadership and a minor in school law.

Along with her educational career, she had a side avocation, as a lifelong owner and operator of rental properties.

In her spare time (what spare time?) she belongs to four book clubs. She's also a member of a chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) and chair of its literary committee. A keen interest in legislative issues is another focus, and she maintains a membership in an association of retired educational personnel.

She believes that a "vibrant AAUW branch" is a community asset as well as an opportunity for educated women to meet others with like interests. When she was looking for a place to put down Florida roots part time, the presence of a strong AAUW branch in Venice spurred her interest in locating in this town.


