#### New Member Barbara J. Constantz



A recent transplant to Venice, Barbara holds a B.A. in international relations from Colgate University, a Master's in international finance from Columbia University, and a certificate in investment management from The Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania.

Barbara grew up outside of Buffalo, NY and is a proud Bills fan. Except for a light dusting that falls like a snow globe and disappears the next day, she really hates the snow. Most of her professional career was spent in the Washington,


DC area. Following her retirement, Barbara and her trusty rescue dog Casey moved to Venice in 2022 where her adult children are frequent visitors. Her daughter Jo is a reporter for Bloomberg News in NYC, and her son Jeffrey is a grants manager for an environmental consultant in DC.

Fostering equality for women and girls has been a lifelong theme for Barbara both personally and professionally. An example: Early on, throughout her children's school years, she was a devoted softball/baseball mom. Jarring inequities abounded, particularly regarding facilities. One of her proudest accomplishments is winning \$1 million in joint funding from Arlington County and Arlington Public Schools for a new HS softball complex on par with the baseball facility. This was the direct result of a Title IX challenge mounted by a small group of determined parents, of which she was an organizer.

A few career highlights: Barbara's early career was spent in NYC, where she worked in commercial banking with large corporate clients in the international, not-for-profit, and higher ed arenas. Seeking more green space, she relocated to the Washington, DC area, which became home for over 35 years.

While in DC Barbara served as SVP and Treasurer of the National Geographic Society, one of the world's largest nonprofit scientific and educational organizations. She was the first woman to serve as a senior financial officer since the Society's founding in 1888. For 23 years Barbara oversaw the Society's global treasury operations which spanned 25 countries, negotiated over \$1B in debt financing, and managed nearly \$1B of marketable investments.

Subsequently, Barbara returned to commercial banking as Executive Director for JPMorgan's Not-For-Profit, Higher Ed & Healthcare team in the mid-Atlantic. There she had the pleasure of working with an amazing array of prominent universities and mission-driven organizations, including AARP. Barbara also liaised with AAUW's headquarters, which provided research for a panel presentation JPMorgan sponsored on women's career mobility (or lack thereof) in higher ed finance. AAUW also facilitated a salary negotiation workshop for the JPMorgan Women's Group. At both NGS and JPMorgan Barbara prioritized the mentoring of junior staff, especially women, which resulted in bonds retained to this day.





You may have only known her as a serious bridge player but Barbara was also one of AAUW Venice's leading ladies, having served as branch president from 2001 to 2005.

Originally from Chicago, she graduated from Drake University in Ames, Iowa, with a degree in elementary education. Marriage took her to Pennsylvania where her new husband was in graduate school. Once she had children, she continued working as a substitute teacher.

A move to Long Island, New York, prompted her to return to school. She completed her graduate work at Long Island University, earning a master's degree in library science. Her new credentials took her to the Great Neck library system where she worked for 16 years until she retired. She said, "I worked in most departments, everything from media to reference."

She was an AAUW member while on Long Island but "couldn't participate much due to working."

Relocating to Florida, she said, "was the best move of my life." She joined the Venice branch soon after landing here in 1997. She encouraged new AAUW members to participate by stating "The best thing you can do for yourself is get involved. I really don't know how someone can join and not participate." In her case, she took on a board position as secretary. "And then, when the nominating committee had a hard time finding someone to run for president", she took that on. "I guess I stepped up," she said.

The branch Home Tour began while she was president. An early project in the STEM area also took place during her tenure. "It was a competition at the elementary school level," she explained.

After completing two terms as Venice branch president, she went on to a term as AAUW Florida State president from 2008 to 2010.

For the past number of years, she played bridge but says that was "an understatement." She also started the duplicate bridge group at this branch. In addition to playing, she taught AAUW duplicate players once a month.

Cook's Corner and Play Readers were two of the special interest groups (SIG) she attended. She said that she "enjoyed every moment she has been an AAUW member", always making the most of her membership."

### DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION

#### "SPEAKING OUT WITH CURLY HAIR"

On May 11th several branch members attended a lecture given by 19-year-old Zander Moricz at the Jacaranda Library. Moricz is the class president who, from media reports of a year ago, gave a newsworthy graduation speech at the Sarasota County Pine View High School. Zander used the metaphor of having curly hair in his speech to explain his activism surrounding his support for the LGBTQ community and his fight to stop the new laws in Florida known as "Don't Say Gay". (He was born with curly hair. He couldn't straighten it!) In 2019 he established the student-led organization, the Social Equity and Education Alliance (SEE). It began in his high school and has gained momentum with students working across Florida to energize voters amid the rise of anti-LGBTQ legislation. The inspiring, now Harvard student, spoke to a room of over 100 Venice residents about his past year. He and another PV graduate and SEE administrator, Anya Dennison, have been busy organizing to oppose many of the new pieces of legislation and action in Florida which, to many, are imposing restrictions to First Amendment rights. They spent so much of their first college semester working on SEE that they felt they had to take a semester sabbatical with the expectation of returning in the future.

Zander and his supporters are fighting to get young voters on the voting rolls and older voters to be sure they are following new voter rules in Florida. The group has rented a space in Sarasota from which to work. They have determined that they need to start with smaller elected offices and Boards of Education members as targets. They will partner Gen Z (born in mid 1990's to mid 2010's) and Baby Boomers (most AAUW members) to talk with voters. Social media will also play into their connecting with voters. ## LOOKING BACK AT MAY'S GENERAL MEETING PRESENTATION WITH JAN HARRIS

Member extraordinaire, Dr. Jan Harris, kept the audience captivated with her presentation on May 11<sup>th</sup> entitled "A Look at Women's Friendships in Relation to the Pandemic and Social Media." As a professor of sociology, Jan has followed renown researchers on the topic of friendships, firmly believing in the essential nature of human connections and social bonding.

Her presentation included an interactive exercise where the audience was required to use one-word descriptors for a fulfilling friendship AND a one-word label for what we bring to a friend relationship. I personally found this intriguing and not easy! Over 4 dozen characteristics were identified, ranging from kind to empathetic to loyal . . .and more!

Jan pointed out that we may have hundreds of friends on social media, but maintaining true friendships requires fairly precious resources: time and energy. And that leads to our 'friendship capacity'!

In the end, it's touch that truly connects us! "Social media can't replicate social bonding!" Jan said in concluding remarks.

My personal take-aways: (1) Yes, it was essential to see and talk with AAUW friends in book club and other circles during the pandemic via Zoom; (2) Yes, I followed many 'friends' via Facebook who seemed to be thriving through the pandemic, congratulating them for positive strides; but . . . (3) I know that reaching out, physically, can mean the most! Thank you, Jan!!
