MEET OUR PHENOMENAL SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

Forty AAUW Venice members came to meet and congratulate our five scholarship recipients on November 20, 2023, at the Café Venice on the Isle. Each of the women shared their educational journeys and the impact of the scholarship they received. Their stories were all different and yet their paths crossed that night, due to the desire to better their lives by returning to school.

These are their stories:

Larissa Lippe is a freshman at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia and is seeking a business degree. Graduating in June 2022, Larissa took a gap year to work on her business, Smart Kids Tutor. When the pandemic shut down schools, Larissa recognized that many students needed tutoring assistance and she had some smart friends who needed to earn money. The company started out with just a few tutors in Sarasota County, but more continue to join. During the pandemic, the tutoring was done remotely, but recently Larissa created the non-profit Smart Kids Foundation. As a result, rooms are reserved in local libraries for after school tutoring. Larissa works closely with a local woman to reduce tutoring costs for low-income students. She was recognized as a Florida Academic Scholar, has been nominated to the Tampa Business Hall of Fame, and produced a TED TALK. To finance her education, Larissa applied and received a PELL Grant, and applied to Emory University for financial assistance and a work grant.

Veronika Gemesi left Slovakia alone when she was just 19, struggled financially but is now married with one child. For 12 years she worked as a waitress to earn money for her education. In 2020 she enrolled in the Bachelor of Science in Applied Psychology with a concentration in media and technology at the University of Phoenix. Prior to the pandemic, Veronika was fearful about going back to school, but she wants to benefit her life as well as the life of her daughter. She keeps a positive attitude, an open mindset, and believes that life's obstacles also bring opportunities. To accommodate her studies, Veronika changed jobs and now works at a bank during the day.

Heather Gomez was raised in New Jersey in a single parent household. Ever since she was little she wanted to be a teacher. Heather went to college following her high school graduation but left after two years to get married and have children. She works fulltime as a paraprofessional in a Title 1 school in Sarasota County. Now 20 years later, Heather is finishing her teaching degree in an online program at St. Leo University. Her lessons via Zoom are with highly trained instructors and she is already planning to attend graduate school for a Reading Endorsement. SWAG (Students with Amazing Goals) is a school club Heather began a few years ago. She helps students set a goal, prepare steps to accomplish it, and track their progress. In 2021, Heather was chosen as the "Sarasota County School Related Employee of the Year."

AnnMarie Medico has a bachelor's degree in biology. However, now 27 years old, she has decided to return to college for a Bachelor of Science in nursing. Eventually she would like to become a Nurse Practitioner with an emphasis in pediatrics. AnnMarie volunteers at the Virginia B. Andes Community Clinic, providing free medical services for the underserved. She is enrolled at WGU- Western Governors University.

Cassie Davis graduated in 2019 and went to work full time at Bayfront St. Pete Hospital as a Unit Secretary. That working experience gave her the opportunity to better understand the nursing profession. As a result, Cassie decided to enroll in the LPN program at Manatee Technical College and which she recently completed. Cassie is now enrolled full time in State College of Florida in the nursing program and hopes to become an RN. Due to family issues, Cassie was not able to attend the reception.

Do You Have Something to Say?? Let's Hear It!

Last month, we highlighted the vital importance of voting to preserve our voices.

It is an essential right and responsibility of our democracy. And local elections have become more impactful than ever. OK, in theory – but there is so much NOISE out there!

How can we keep up?

There's a great voter education tool created by The League of Women Voters that can help! Bookmark it for future reference: <u>https://www.vote411.org/</u>

The tool personalizes voter information by pinpointing your eligibility to vote in upcoming elections, providing info on the candidates, and much more.

You can also voice your opinion directly to those in positions of authority.

Our initial Public Policy page in September outlined how to contact your state and local legislators. (Past *Venice Views* issues are on the website.)

Given the mounting controversies surrounding its leadership and policies, we're also providing contact info for the Sarasota School Board. Find email addresses for individual members and the entire Board <u>here.</u>

Issues include accountability of voucher expenditures, support for public education, the fitness of elected members to serve, book restrictions, and respectful treatment of LGBTQ+ persons – to highlight a few!

You can also contact Governor DeSantis directly <u>here.</u> He's the only one who can change members between election cycles. Tell him what you think!

Another powerful way to use your voice: Write a Letter to the Editor!

The Daily Sun, Herald Tribune, and The Venice Gondolier accept letters on public interest or policy policies. There is an online version, too. Letter writers must follow their guidelines. This includes keeping the letter 200-300 words or less (depending on the publication) and attaching your full name, address, e-mail address, or phone number. Letter writers are limited to one letter every 30 days. If a letter is more than 250 words, they will ask the writer to trim it, or they may trim the letter to fit if the writer does not respond. Letters will also be edited for grammar and spelling. While they have a lenient rule regarding the content of letters, the editorial board will reject a letter it deems potentially libelous, racist, hateful, or a personal attack or if the writer criticizes a business by name. Letter writers are also not allowed to address a previous letter writer by name.

ISSUES REGARDING BOOK BANNING IN SCHOOLS AND LIBRARIES 2023

Many of us have become quite alarmed here in Florida over what seems like a scene from Ray Bradbury's famous 1953 dystopian novel *Fahrenheit 451*. Remember that the title references the temperature at which books burn. Most formally and informally educated people tend to believe that having the opportunity to read widely supports an informed citizenry. Below is a summary of two articles, one from the *Tallahassee Democrat News* and the other from the *Naples News* about the arguments arising from removing several classics and other new favorites from school libraries.

PEN America (a free expression advocacy writers group) keeps track of book bans nationally. During 2022-23, 3,362 books were banned, a 33% jump over the previous school year. According to their statistics, more books were removed from shelves in Florida public schools than any other state, 1,400 or 40% of the national total. The main source of this is FL House Bill 1069, which allows schools to limit materials that reference sex and sexuality, gender, pronouns, and reproductive health, and a pair of lawsuits filed in the US District Court of Northern District of Florida over the removal of books in school libraries in Escambia and Lake counties.

Florida Attorney General Ashley Moore recently wrote a legal brief stating, "Public school systems, including their libraries, convey the government's message." The state maintains that books on school shelves represent protected government speech. School libraries are 'a forum for government speech,' not a 'forum for free expression.' First Amendment experts and advocates find Florida's argument that schools have a First Amendment right to remove LGBTQ books extreme and chilling.

Experts interviewed for the *Tallahassee Democrat News* all gave grave warnings about what court support for the state's argument could mean. One expert stated, "If government speech determines what books can be in the library, the government is essentially saying your children can only see the ideas the government has approved." A 1982 Supreme Court decision ruled that school boards have "significant discretion" regarding school libraries, but it "may not be exercised in a narrowly partisan or political manner."

The very recent Collier County School plan restricts almost 400 titles. Some titles include: *Brave New World, The Color Purple, Catch-22, The Handmaid's Tale, A Game of Thrones, Forrest Gump, Ender's Game, The Kite Runner, 2001: Space Odyssey,* and so on. One parent said, "Sadly, many of the books pulled include stories about black, brown, and LGBTQ lives." Another said, "I'm deeply concerned that many of these (banned) titles are standard on honors and AP high school reading lists. And I don't think we're doing our children any favors by not allowing them to read sophisticated, complex, and sometimes classical works of literature."

So many issues are being turned inside out. Many of us have been concerned that our children and grandchildren are spending too much time with technology in their hands and they aren't reading. AAUW supports equality and diversity.

For the January meeting members of this SIG are asked to read the book *Stuck in Neutral* by Terry Trueman and/or *Stamped: Racism, Antiracism, and You* by Reynolds and Kendi.

The articles below are for the new VV section regarding organizations which support the national positions and other activities of interest locally.

The *Social Justice Alliance of the Florida Suncoast* (SJAFS) "was recently formed by a coalition of organizations in Sarasota and Charlotte Counties that strive to foster a more equitable and inclusive society through advocacy, activism, collaboration, and community -led initiatives". Their biggest outreach so far will be a "Right to Read Festival" on Saturday, February 24 on the grounds of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Venice at 1971 Pinebrook Rd., Venice from 10 to 4. There will be events for all ages. For adults there will be several local and national speakers addressing the concern that Florida has the distinction of being the state with the most banned books of any state. Speakers will appear on two stages giving lectures. There will be authors from Florida who are fighting to preserve the right to read their books in the state. There will be books, merchandise, food vendors, entertainment including a children's corner complete with fun activities, and a bounce house. Volunteers will be needed. Please contact Lynda Weston if you can give some time, but please put this on your calendar and spread the word to likeminded people.

The Sarasota Library System has announced their One County One Book selection for 2024. The book is "An Immense World" by Ed Yong. The

author will give a talk on March 1st at 10:30 at the North Port Suncoast Technical College.




