Speaking at the event will be NY Times best-selling author B.A. Shapiro. Her latest book, *The Lost Masterpiece* will be available for sale and autographs.

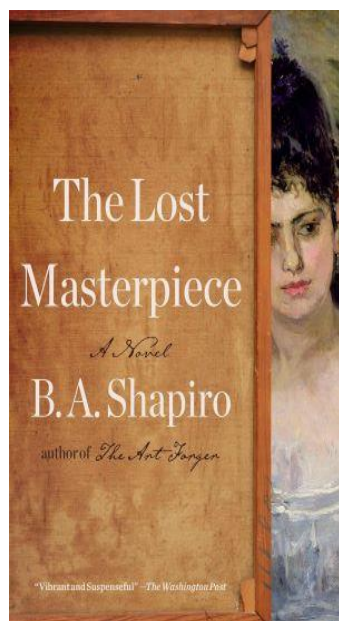

Aplos is A-Plus

Aplos is an ideal tool for AAUW because of its ease of use and support services. Churches and small nonprofits are the primary users and often rely on volunteers to handle complex finances. Aplos is software that is specifically designed for this type of fund accounting.

The Aplos software generates Income Statements, Balance Sheets, and Transaction Lists for monthly reports. Banks separate accounts into checking and savings. Aplos includes separate reports for operating and restricted funds. There is an application to reconcile records with the bank at the end of the month.

Aplos allows us to set up an event to sell tickets online for a fundraiser. It tracks donations and number of tickets sold online. Donors may find this option convenient. Paula Dulski

BE INFORMED! From Debbie Blackwell

Coalitions are powerful when they're purposeful. Build coalitions because partners share the same stakes, care about similar issues, and need one another to win. They are not a shortcut to diversity – don't form a coalition hoping it will automatically make your effort more inclusive. Our aim is to organize with, not for, communities most impacted by inequity in education and economic security. Working in coalition brings diverse perspectives and skills, boosts credibility and visibility, and can unlock financial or in-kind support. Just as important, partnerships help all groups better serve their communities and create lasting change.

- We are in coalition with the League of Women Voters of Sarasota County. Attend a school board meeting and speak up for public education - everybody do your share!

Currently the most overwhelming issue is the Schools of Hope Law and takeover attempts with what seems to be profiteering at taxpayer expense. Read to get some local concerns on this link:

AAUW stands for Education

Public Education:

- Investing in strong public education systems which provide equitable high quality public K-12 education
- Opposing the use of public funds for nonpublic elementary, secondary education, and charter schools that do not adhere to the same civil rights and accountability standards as required of public schools
- Closing the learning and opportunity gaps that disproportionately affect students from low-income and underserved groups
- **Inclusive Curriculum:**
 - Ensuring curriculum information is information based on scientific consensus, and is free from censorship and political, religious, or cultural bias
- **STEM Opportunities:**
 - Closing the gender gap in the science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) education
 - Expanding access for women in technical and vocational education and training that leads to lucrative employment
- **Strengthened Civil Rights Protections**
 - Strengthening civil rights statutes impacting education including Title IX, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, and other applicable laws
 - Reinstating Title IX rules that strengthen and clarify protections for student survivors of sexual harassment and assault, ensure schools provide accommodations for pregnant and parenting students, and affirm Title IX's protections from discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity
 - Prohibiting harassment and bullying in schools, including support of enumerated anti-bullying and harassment laws and policies
- **Higher Education:**

- Supporting equitable access to higher education, which is affordable, inclusive and yields high-quality credentials or degrees through increasing investment in financial support for degree programs and addressing the debt burden which disproportionately impacts women and borrowers of color
- Expanding access for women in career and technical education and training that yields high quality credentials or degrees
- Reducing barriers to postsecondary success through policies that mitigate non-tuition challenges to completing a degree or high-quality certificate program, including supporting pregnant or parenting students, expanding access to affordable childcare, and ensuring access to contraception and reproductive rights.

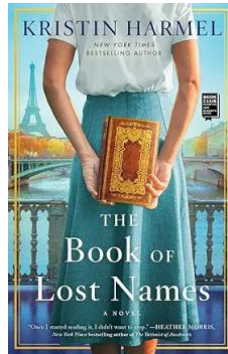
Cook's Corner
